

ESTABLISHED: First settled in 1826; town proclaimed in 1843. FAMOUS FOR: A warm country welcome across four well defined seasons, historical churches and buildings and a thriving agricultural industry.

BLAYNEY HISTORICAL MILESTONES: The railway arrived in

town in 1876, lime kilns were constructed in 1877 and Council was incorporated in 1882. The first school was built in 1858, the hospital foundation stone laid in 1910

and the high school opened in 1974. WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Blayney is home to a friendly, vibrant community surrounded by picturesque countryside. You'll find modern facilities and a growing retail and dining scene in town. Take a drive along the backroads from Bathurst, Orange or Cowra and enjoy the spectacular views and landscapes.





FAST FACTS

POPULATION: 1,512 ESTABLISHED: 1844 FAMOUS FOR: Hot Air Ballooning, 360 million year old fossil discovery, Heritage buildings, Galleries & Museums

CANOWINDR HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Ben Hall's bushranger gang

managed to bail-up the town not once but twice in the 1860s. The world renowned Devonian Fish Fossils were discovered here in 1956.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Canowindra is located on the Belubula River and the valley provides ideal conditions for hot air ballooning - look out for these overhead as you enjoy the town. The "bendy" main street follows an old bullock track and the streetscape is like a step back in time. Bring your camera as the grand old buildings will make for some memorable pictures. Enjoy the friendliness of the locals, the boutique shopping and the local produce. There are plenty of great places to stay too. Why not stay a night or two and explore our cellar doors. Canowindra is an RV friendly town with a dump point located at Canowindra Caravan Park.

Don't miss the 360 million year old fossil collection, housed in the Age of Fishes Museum – do the audio tour, there's one for kids too.



POPULATION: 218 FAMOUS FOR: Second oldest settlement west of the Blue Mountains and birthplace of famous Paralympian and Marathon winner Kurt Fearnley OAM CARCOAR

FAST FACTS

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Thomas Icely was an early colonial NSW landholder and stockbreeder and a wellrespected member of the Legislative Council for over 30 years. Icely was granted land in the Carcoar district which increased to 150,000 acres. He established Carcoar for law, order and services. In the 1850's gold was discovered in the area creating a large gold rush and increase in population. In 1863 bushrangers Gilbert and O'Meally attempted the first daylight bank robbery in the colony! The Carcoar hospital was opened in 1861 and is the 2nd oldest hospital west of Blue Mountains.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Step back in time to the charm of an English style historical village with preserved heritage homes and public buildings. Have a BBQ or picnic in Kurt Fearnley Park by the beautiful Belubula River.



POPULATION: 235 ESTABLISHED: 1869 TRAIL: Part of the Orange Wine Trail FAMOUS FOR: Gold Mining

CARGO

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: The village has a strong history of gold mining with major booms from 1869 - 1879 and again for 1885 - 1899. A stopover for the Cobb and Co coaches from Orange to Canowindra.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Cargo offers a relaxed lifestyle, and it's a great stopover for lunch or a drink with friends. Families will enjoy the inviting parks and gardens with BBQ facilities. The village is surrounded by prime agricultural land - the slopes and hills are a photographers delight and just a 30 minute drive south west of Orange.



CUDAL

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Cudal is an Aboriginal word meaning 'flat'. Major Mitchell's Monument is located 7 kms east of Cudal, acknowledging his survey of the area in 1834.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Cudal's wide main street compliments a relaxed lifestyle with Boree Creek running beside the village. Cudal offers the services of a Health Centre, swimming pool, a lovely park with picnic and children's play area, sports oval, showground and two churches. Also dining experiences include, cafe, hotel, well stocked Post Office, newsagent and a small motel and caravan park.



POPULATION: 275

ESTABLISHED: 1865

FAMOUS FOR: Home of the Animals on Bikes paddock TRAILS: Animals on Bikes sculpture trail. Did you know Cumnock has produced 5 "Wallaby" rugby players -over the years? And they all

lived down Burgoon Lane!

CUMNOCK

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: First settled as a farming community in 1865. Check out the huge radio transmission tower, west of the village which has been helping to broadcast ABC radio since 1937.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Cumnock is a close knit community with lots of historic charm. Services include a hotel, general store, sports facilities and family friendly parks. The rolling hills surrounding the village are well regarded for sheep and wool production, cattle and grain. Cumnock pioneered the farmhouse rental program and won Community of the Year Award in 2010 – population under 17,000.



FAST FACTS

Population: 530 Established: 1866

Famous for: Escort Rock Robbery historic site, the Eugowra Murals and the gateway to Nangar National Park. Eugowra's high quality granite was used in the construction of the new Parliament House in Canberra.

EUGOWRA

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Eugowra was established as a stopover point on the Mandagery Creek during the gold rush era. The largest gold robbery in Australian history happened here back in 1862. The infamous bushranger Frank Gardiner and his gang that included Ben Hall got away with 2,719 ounces of gold and 3,700 pounds in cash – a multi-million dollar haul in today's values.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Today Eugowra welcomes many visitors touring the area. Enjoy the historic charm and discover the renowned murals painted on buildings throughout the village. There's plenty of history to absorb, shopping and places to stay. A twilight drive in any direction will reward you with amazing views. Eugowra is an RV friendly town with a dump point located on Myall St.

POPULATION: 327

ESTABLISHED: 1851 FAMOUS FOR: A history of Gold mining established during the gold rush of 1851.

LUCKNOW

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: The Lucknow goldfield was discovered in 1851, soon after Australia's first payable gold was found at nearby Ophir. The entire mining area was owned by William Charles Wentworth; the gold field was known as the Wentworth Field until the name Lucknow was adopted in 1863. Peaks in gold production occurred from 1860 through to 1899 and again in the late 1920s. At its peak in the 1880s - 1890s Wentworth goldfield was one of the richest in NSW.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Lucknow's gold mining heritage lives on with relics of poppet heads, mine buildings and cottages, mullock heaps and bluestone dam walls visible in and around the village. Lucknow remains a popular stopover as visitors can enjoy historic walks, relaxing meals, local vineyards and some quirky shopping.



MUSEUM TRAIL - VISIT THE MUSEUMS OF **MOLONG, YEOVAL, PARKES & EUGOWRA**

From Orange, head to Molong and visit the Molong Historical Museum. Turn left onto Banjo Paterson Way and head to Yeoval via Cumnock to visit the Banio Paterson Museum. From Yeoval, head to Parkes via Renshaw McGirr Way/Wellington Road to visit the Parkes Radio Telescope 'The Dish'. Travel from Parkes to Eugowra and visit the Historical Society Museum/Gold History and view the renowned **Escort Rock**. Return from Eugowra to Orange via Cudal on the Escort Way.

MUSEUM TRAIL 2 - VISIT THE MUSEUMS **OF CANOWINDRA**

From Orange, head to Canowindra via Nashdale and Cargo on Cargo Road. In Canowindra, visit the Age of Fishes Museum, Canowindra Historical Museum and the historic buildings/bent Main St. Return from Canowindra to Orange via Cudal and Borenore.

MUSEUM TRAIL - VISIT THE MUSEUMS OF MOLONG AND MANILDRA

From Orange, head to Molong and visit the Molong Historical Museum. Head out on Wellington Street to Manildra to visit the Amusu Theatre Manildra & Manildra Flour Mills. Return from Manildra to Orange via Cudal and Borenore.

ANIMALS ON BIKES - A 120km "Paddock Art" sculpture tourist trail along the scenic Banjo Paterson Way from Molong to the Taronga Western Plains Zoo, Dubbo From Orange, head to Molong, Turn left onto Banjo Paterson Way and head to Yeoval via Cumnock and continue on to Taronga Western Plains Zoo, Dubbo exploring all the sculptures along the way. Return from Dubbo to Orange via Wellington (Wellington Caves) and Molong.

SCENIC TRAIL - THIS TRAIL HAS GREAT SCENERY FOR ANY PHOTOGRAPHY ENTHUSIAST.

From Orange, head to Molong via Amaroo Rd, then back along Peabody Rd towards Cudal and Eugowra along the Escort Way. Enjoy the beautiful scenery on this scenic trail. Return to Orange via Canowindra, Cargo and Nashdale.

WINE TRAIL - VISIT 10 WINERIES ALONG **THIS TRAIL** (*Refer to Wine Trail Pad Map*) From Orange, head to Canowindra via Nashdale and Cargo with the choice of 10 wineries to enjoy on your way.

GOLD RUSH - DISCOVER GOLD HISTORY

- From Orange, head to **Ophir Reserve** where you can try your hand at **panning** for gold.
- Prom Orange, head to Eugowra via Cudal to visit **Escort Rock**, where Australia's largest gold robbery took place in 1862 by Frank Gardiner's bushranger gang.


HISTORICAL AND SCENIC TRAIL THROUGH THE BLAYNEY SHIRE

From Orange, head to Millthorpe via Lucknow on the Mitchell Hwy and turn right on the Millthorpe Rd. Stop and discover historic Millthorpe.

Continue on to Blavney and travel out on Newbridge Rd towards Newbridge and visit the historical steam trains. Take the Three Brothers Rd. turn right onto Barry Rd. then left onto Barry/Neville Rd where you can visit the sleepy village of Neville as well as the Valley Piano Arts Café and historical Piano Museum.

Continue on the Neville Rd and turn left on the Mandurama Rd to **Mandurama**. Once in Mandurama, enjoy a cup of tea at the General Store. Take the main road towards Lyndhurst. Travel out of Lyndhurst and turn right down Newry Downs Rd, turn right onto scenic Belubula Way which takes the traveller back to Mandurama.

Travel on the Mid Western Hwy and to historic Carcoar. Visit the Stoke Stable, Toy, Hospital, Court House and Military Museums and St Paul's Church. Take a picnic to the Kurt Fernley park besides Belubula River. Continue on Belubula St out of Carcoar and travel to Blayney. Stop by Carcoar Dam and view the Windfarm. Continue to Blayney and back to Orange via the scenic route. Take a left turn on Browns Creek Rd and turn right onto Tallwood Rd until you reach an intersection. Turn right onto Tallwood Rd to Forest Reefs. Take the Forest Reefs Rd until Forest Rd which enters Orange near the Orange Base Hospital.

POPULATION: 280 FAMOUS FOR: Lyndhurst was one of ten towns on the short list as the site for the Australian Capital Territory and National Capital.

LYNDHURST HISTORICAL MILESTONES: The rich gold fields at nearby Junction Reefs were in full swing in the 1880s and saw Lyndhurst grow as a major centre to support the mining and developing farming community. This included a post office, 24 hour railway, public school, hotel, medical practice, bank, memorial hall and grocery stores between 1869-1925. Famous cricketer Ernie Toshack was raised by his relatives in Lyndhurst after becoming an orphan at the age of six. Ernie went on to play for Australia with Donald Bradman. His family relatives continued

with the general store here until 1970. WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: The hotel and café remain the hub of the village along with the Public School and other services. It's a relaxed stopover for coffee, lunch or a quiet drink. The

Lyndhurst Rifle Club was founded in 1913 and continues today hosting teams from around the world.



THOMAS ICELY, (1797 - 1874) FOUNDING FATHER OF THIS REGION: Thomas Icely was an early colonial landholder and

stockbreeder. He was granted large land holdings from 1823. He later purchased land as well with his main holding, Coombing Park being established in 1831. He established Carcoar for law and order and other services in 1839. Later, to further support his holdings, he established Mandurama for his workers. His name is also associated with the

introduction of Shorthorn stock into Australia. A magistrate and consistent supporter of the Governor he served on the Legislative Council from 1864. He was the first lessee of Elizabeth Farm to which he retired with his family in 1869 and where he died on 13 February 1874.







FAST FACTS

POPULATION: 379 FAMOUS FOR: Thomas Icely, owner of historical ESTABLISHED: 1876 Coombing Park established Mandurama for the workers from his property

MANDURAMA

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Established in 1876 as a privately owned village for the workers of Thomas Icely's property, Coombing Park. The name of the village is derived from the Wiradjuri word for "water holes. During this period the village was a busy place with community halls, a police station, banks, hotel, hospital, churches and a picture theatre! Nearby Junction Reefs was a rich gold mining area in the 1880s. Mandurama was also the central subject of treasured set of photographs known as the Mandurama

Collection (1865 to 1935). WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: The village amenities

include a general store and café, hotel, service station, recreation facilities and other services. Enjoy the beautiful landscapes and countryside, home to some significant homesteads. Take a drive out on Burnt Yards Rd to Errowanbang and witness the beautiful scenery.



MILLTHORPE

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: The discovery of payable gold at Ophir in 1851 and then the Robertson's Land Act of 1861 stimulated an explosion of interest in this area. 

MOLONG

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Originally a police and military

outpost visited by Charles Sturt in 1828. Just east of Molong is the site of Yuranigh's Grave. Yuranigh was an aboriginal tracker who accompanied Sir Thomas Mitchell on his 1864 expedition. Copper Hill located north of Molong was the first copper mine in Australia. The Packham Pear first cultivated

here by Charles Packham in 1896. WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Molong is rich in history with a broad main street and beautifully restored buildings, (many built from local stone). There are cafes, shopping, galleries, museum, extensive medical services, swimming pool, sporting clubs and a variety of accommodation available. NEVILLE

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Established in 1858 with a small public school, Neville soon became a thriving township. In 1866 the Presbyterian Church was built, with the Methodist (now the Uniting Church) and Anglican Churches following in 1878. A post office in 1870 which was later transferred into the Village Store with a telephone exchange in 1897. During the town's growth, a butter company, dressmakers and milliners, a dentist, wheelwright, blacksmiths, motor mechanics, butcher shops, saddler, stock and station agency, slaughterhouse, fruit shop, banker, brick maker, bakehouse and a beer house -Colburt's beer - all existed.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: Tucked away in a quiet corner 3.5 hours from Sydney, the village of Neville offers a unique holiday destination with many activities. Visit the Golden Era Piano Museum, Australia's only piano museum open Saturdays. Neville offers some unique accommodation options so check the website for details. The Presbyterian and Uniting Churches have a service every third Sunday

FAST FACTS

POPULATION: 100 FAMOUS FOR: Historic railway line and station where Queen Elizabeth II stayed overnight in her carriage in 1954

NEWBRIDGE

HISTORICAL MILESTONES: Famous for its steam trains, Newbridge village developed around the railway line and station in 1876. The station was called Back Creek, Rodwell or Rocky Creek and eventually became Duramana with the first post office. The establishment of the railway and influx of railway workers in the early 1870s, saw the township grow and later named Newbridge to avoid confusion with another town of Duramana nearby. During the 1880s, gold and iron were mined. The current village still holds buildings from the past and the community thrives on many activities at the historic Gladstone Hotel (early 1870s), the public school (1877), original bakehouse (1884), police station (1890s), the convent (1890), the new post office (1904) and the Catholic Church

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT NOW: The community comes together with many activities and events during the year. The Australian Railway Historical Society supports steam train visits to the Central West passing through Newbridge, Blayney and Millthorpe. Newbridge forms part of the art trail established from Bathurst to Newbridge and attracts many artists to the local area. The local camping facilities include free electric Barbeque and electricity for

caravans/campers.


