Re: Community Financial Assistance Program Application

I am submitting the BSC Financial Assistance Program Application form on behalf of the **Orange and District Branch** of the Country Education Foundation of Australia Ltd (CEF). We are a national, not-for-profit organisation with DGR 1 status and have been in existence since 2003. We are fortunate that the national head office happens to be based in Orange. The purpose of the Country Education Foundation of Australia (CEF) is to assist rural and regional students to pursue their higher education, training and career goals through financial assistance, scholarships, mentoring and support. Annually the CEF assists approximately 650 school leavers each year.

Annually, the Orange and District Committee raises funds from the local area and uses these funds to help about 25 school-leavers from the Blayney, Orange and Cabonne Local Government Areas. Financial assistance is offered to the selected students in the form of *reimbursement of costs* for items necessary for their courses, for example helping a plumbing apprentice with tools, or a tertiary student with purchasing textbooks.

This year we have 7 students that live in the Blayney Shire Area - and attended various high schools across Orange / Blayney. They are studying a wide range of courses;

- a Light vehicle apprenticeship with Tony Leahey Ford
- Vet science at CSU Wagga
- a Renewable Energy Engineering degree at Newcastle
- Sydney Conservatorium Bachelor of Music
- AMPA Bachelor of Music theatre
- Bachelor in Design Unit of Canberra
- ICMS (Hotel management) Manly



Born and raised in Orange with one younger brother, Emily's mother and father run a small local building company. She says, "they are two of the most dedicated and hardworking people I know."

These are traits they have without question passed along to Emily. At Orange High School, she was the vice-captain and sat in the top three students for all her subjects. Emily's commitment saw her achieve an ATAR that got her accepted to the University of Sydney - one of the most prestigious universities in the country. As a young indigenous woman, and the first in her family to attend university, Emily has what it takes to make her family even more proud.

In her first year studying International Relations and Criminology in 2020, she is acutely aware of the wrongdoings and injustices in the world and the need for change. This is partly through hearing of her grandfather's experiences with the stolen generation and the cycles of disadvantage in indigenous communities.

She is an amazing young woman, determined, committed and passionate about leaving her mark to make the world a better place.



The initiatives annually bring out the best creativity of school students across the state. The initiatives were coordinated in April for inception into both public and catholic schools with the aim of providing students with a greater understanding on NAIDOC Week and the importance of friendship and cultural diversity.





The 2021 NAIDOC Week School initiatives have again proven to be an overwhelming success even throughout the COVID-19 situation that seen some schools participate through schools online learning. The initiatives annually bring out the best creativity of school students across the state. The initiatives were coordinated in April for inception into both public and catholic schools with the aim of providing students with a greater understanding on NAIDOC Week and the importance of friendship and cultural diversity.

The concept was again supported by various state and federal departments who supported the initiatives for the tenth year. Over the years since they were introduced it has been supported by many government agencies including Department of Prime Minister & Cabinet, Australia Post, Department of Education, Skills & Employment, Department of Health (OATSIH), Department of Education NSW Aboriginal Land Council, NSW Health, NSW Justice and Transport for NSW. We thank these agencies for the different levels of support they have provided the initiatives.

Two Indigenous Australians were selected; Jessica Mauboy (Indigenous Singer & Actress) & Lance Franklin (Indigenous Sportsperson) as Indigenous Australians to aspire and the message on the entry form to students "Be Smart, Stay Clean and Live the Dream".

Initial submissions were presented to the Department of Education, Skills & Employment, NSW Department of Education and NSW Aboriginal Land Council after negotiation on this year's topics and with the support of these units the initiatives were launched for 2021.

Information packages including entry forms, information sheets detailing conditions of entry and prizes to be won by students and posters were sent around the state to all school principals, Aboriginal education assistants and district office Aboriginal community liaison officers.

The response from schools this year was overwhelming and majority of schools across the state participated in the initiatives with 203,117 entries received for judging, this was during a time when some schools were shut down due to COVID-19, many schools have participated through online learning.

Presentation of NAIDOC Medals of Excellence were presented to the winning students were held at special school assemblies and were where possible by Elders, Executive Director, NAIDOC Week School Initiatives, Director, Social Wellbeing & Community – Koori Kids, local Mayor or representatives, Regional Director of Schools, Delegates from the Department of Education, NSW Aboriginal Land Council's, and Australia Post. I would particularly like to acknowledge; Hon. Sarah Mitchell M.P - Minister for Education & Early Childhood Learning, Ms Jayde Ward (Catholic Schools NSW), Local Mayors and Mayoral Representatives; Northern Beaches Council, City of Canada Bay, Sutherland Shire Council, Snowy Monaro Regional Council, Waverley Council, Albury City Council, Newcastle City Council, Gunnedah Shire Council, Upper Hunter Shire Council, Orange City Council, Ryde City Council, Inverell Shire Council, Inner West Council, Wagga Wagga City Council, Fairfield City Council, Goulburn-Mulwaree Council, Blacktown City Council, Port Macquarie-Hastings Council and Representatives of the Aboriginal Land Council for taking time out of their schedules to attend the school presentations.

Support of Local Councils and Shires was sought through submission to respective General Managers seeking council's support. The response of local government was overwhelming and involved local council and shires that assisted the initiatives in a variety of ways including monetary support, publicity support for local schools and agreement to display entries received from their respective local government area schools in council chambers and libraries during NAIDOC Week 2021.

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
Congratulations to our Winners

Dear Daniel,

Thank you for assessing our application to subdivide our land at 238 Forest Reefs Rd, Millthorpe. It appears that we have met all the Council criteria regarding our subdivision except for a request to dedicate a road reserve from our proposed cal de sac to the neighbours (Lot 2 DP1204940) boundary fence. This is to allow the neighbour to access and use our road as they do not have a suitable access from Forest Reefs Road. This stipulation has been put in place in the event that they might also subdivide their land.

We do not wish to have a connecting road from our property to theirs.

In 2019 we contacted Barnson Pty Ltd to help us design and prepare a subdivision for our property. In consultation with your Planning Department we finally submitted a DA to Council on 8th March 2021. At this time were we not advised that we would need to allow a road reserve for our neighbour.

Our concept plan was for us to retain our house block and subdivide the remaining land into 14 five acre blocks. One block will be accessed from our driveway and thirteen blocks will be accessed from a road to be constructed approximately 700 metres long with a cal de sac at the end.

We have purposely planned the road to be in the middle of our land and not be constructed near boundary fences to avoid neighbours accessing the road and making it a thoroughfare. We have four neighbours so we went to the centre of our property to avoid having this issue.

By having a cal de sac and not a through road it will give privacy to the blocks facing the northern side and reduce traffic and noise. Most of the blocks have a rural outlook and at this stage no other development to impede their uninterrupted view of Mt Canobolas.

As you are aware our neighbour on 280 Forest Reefs Rd, has the same zoning as us. Recently the Council did some work on the corner of the property which meant the gate into the house block was no longer accessible. The Council constructed a new entrance halfway down the hill, which we assume was compliant with access regulations to rural properties. If this property is zoned for sub division, but does not have a suitable access that was designed and installed by the Council, shouldn't this zoning be changed back to rural? What would have happened if they wanted to subdivide and we did not?

We have prospective buyers waiting for us to get approval for our subdivision and hope that we can soon get consent to start without dedicating a road reserve to the Council which will not be beneficial to us.

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1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

Barnson Pty Ltd has been engaged by Peter & Rosemarie Amos to prepare information in support of a Development Application (DA) for the subdivision of Lot 3 DP 546309, 238 Forest Reefs Road, Millthorpe NSW 2798.

The subject site is located on the northern side of Forest Reefs Road, within 2kms of Millthorpe. The subject site has an area of approximately 36.95 hectares and frontage to Forest Reefs Road of approximately 738.8m. The subject site currently accommodates a dwelling house with associated farm buildings.

The proposed development will consist of a subdivision to create a road and 15 lots being between 2-3 hectares including a similar sized lot to support the existing homestead.

The site is zoned R5 Large Lot Residential under *Blayney Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2012*. The proposed development is defined as a subdivision, which is permissible in the R5 zone pursuant to Clause 4.1 of the LEP.

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2 EXISTING ENVIRONMENT

2.1 Location and Title




Figure 1 – Site Location

The subject land of this application is Lot 3 DP 546309, 238 Forest Reefs Road, Millthorpe, NSW 2798. The subject site is located on the northern side of the Forest Reefs Road, approximately 2kms west of Millthorpe centre. Refer to **Figures 1 and 2** and **Appendix A**.

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2.2 Land Use

The site is located on the outskirts of the Millthorpe village township. The subject site currently accommodates a homestead and associated outbuildings. The site is used for some pasture and grazing purposes. Refer to **Plates 1 and 2** below:

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2.3 Topography

The site is undulating throughout. Contour levels are shown on Subdivision Plans, in **Appendix B**. They range from 927m AHD in north west corner to 938m AHD around the homestead.

2.4 Groundwater

The site is mapped in the LEP as being groundwater vulnerable, as shown in Figure 3.

2.5 Flora and Fauna

The site is predominantly cleared with a few remnant trees within heavily grazed paddocks. The Elm trees lining the existing entrance and others forming part of landscaping around the homestead will not be impacted. Refer to Plate 3.




Figure 4 – LEP Map Extract – Biodiversity




Figure 5 – LEP Map Extract – Riparian Lands and Waterways

The site is not identified as having Riparian lands and Waterways applicable LEP map, refer to Figure 5.

2.7 Services

A number of services including electricity and telecommunications are available to the site. Existing improvements are afforded with water tanks for harvesting and reuse and onsite effluent management.

There is an existing water main, managed by Central Tablelands Water, on the southern side of Forest Reefs Road, servicing Charles Booth Way.

2.8 Access and Traffic

The subject site fronts Forest Reefs Road which is in reasonable sealed condition and is approximately 7m wide, with one lane in each direction, centre line-marking and vegetated table drains on both sides. The speed limit is 80km/h. The road is straight and flat; and while exiting the homestead driveway sight distances exceed 250m in both directions.

Further existing traffic conditions are reported in the Traffic Impact Assessment, prepared by Barnson's engineer, in **Appendix C**.

2.9 Heritage

A search of the NSW Office of Environment & Heritage's Heritage Inventory and the *Blayney LEP* 2012 was undertaken for the site. This revealed that the site does not contain any Heritage Items.

An Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) search (refer Appendix D) has not found any record of Aboriginal Sites or Places on or within 200m of the site.

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3 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

The proposed development is for a large lot subdivision of Lot 3 DP 546309, 238 Forest Reefs Road, Millthorpe, NSW 2798.

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Details of the proposed development works are as follows:

Road network – All new allotments shall have direct access to the proposed road. The road network and proposed access crossovers to each lot will be constructed and sealed to support the proposed subdivision in accordance with Council's requirements. The homestead shall retain its existing access to Forest Reefs Road.

Earthworks & Stormwater – Minimal cut and fill is proposed for the road network construction. Appropriate stormwater mitigation methods shall be utilised.

Water & Sewer — Reticulated water supply will be provided to the proposed subdivision, extending from the nearest water main line at the intersection of Forest Reefs Road and Charles Booth Way. Preliminary water supply design details have been prepared in **Appendix E**.

The proposed lots will be serviced by onsite effluent disposal systems to be dealt with under separately as dwelling applications are made. The size of the lots and general lack of constraints are a positive indication that the onsite effluent systems shall be able to support general housing development.

Electricity & telecommunications – Electricity and telecommunication infrastructure shall be provided to each lot from existing lines that service the locality.

Refer to Subdivision Plans in Appendix B and Civil Plans in Appendix E.

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4 LAND USE ZONING

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The subject site is zoned R5 Large Lot Residential under *Blayney Local Environmental Plan (LEP)* 2012 (LEP). which permits dwelling houses and a range of other types of development.

The proposed subdivision is permissible with consent as the lots meet the specified minimum lot size of 2ha in the R5 zone, pursuant to Clause 4.1 of the LEP.

The permissibility of the proposed development is assessed in terms of the heads of consideration in Section 4.15 of the *Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979*, which incorporates consideration of the LEP and the objectives and permissible uses outlined in the R5 zone, as outlined in **Section 5** of this report.



5 PLANNING CONSIDERATIONS

5.1 Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016

5.1.1 Is the development likely to significantly affect threatened species?

Clause 7.2 of the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016* (BC Act) identifies the following circumstances where a development is likely to significantly affect threatened species:

- (a) it is likely to significantly affect threatened species or ecological communities, or their habitats, according to the test in section 7.3, or
- (b) the development exceeds the biodiversity offsets scheme threshold if the biodiversity offsets scheme applies to the impacts of the development on biodiversity values, or
- (c) it is carried out in a declared area of outstanding biodiversity value.

5.1.1.1 Section 7.3 Test

To determine whether a development is likely to significantly affect threatened species or ecological communities, or their habitats, the following is to be taken into account in accordance with Section 7.3 of the BC Act:

- (a) in the case of a threatened species, whether the proposed development or activity is likely to have an adverse effect on the life cycle of the species such that a viable local population of the species is likely to be placed at risk of extinction,
- (b) in the case of an endangered ecological community or critically endangered ecological community, whether the proposed development or activity:
 - is likely to have an adverse effect on the extent of the ecological community such that its local occurrence is likely to be placed at risk of extinction, or
 - (ii) is likely to substantially and adversely modify the composition of the ecological community such that its local occurrence is likely to be placed at risk of extinction,
- (c) in relation to the habitat of a threatened species or ecological community:
 - the extent to which habitat is likely to be removed or modified as a result of the proposed development or activity, and
 - (ii) whether an area of habitat is likely to become fragmented or isolated from other areas of habitat as a result of the proposed development or activity, and
 - (iii) the importance of the habitat to be removed, modified, fragmented or isolated to the long-term survival of the species or ecological community in the locality,
- (d) whether, the proposed development or activity is likely to have an adverse effect on any declared area of outstanding biodiversity value (either directly or indirectly),
- (e) whether the proposed development or activity is or is part of a key threatening process or is likely to increase the impact of a key threatening process.

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Comment: The subject site is heavily disturbed as a result of previous agricultural activities. Considering the ecology within the study area, the proposed development is not likely to significantly affect threatened species or ecological communities, or their habitats. Refer also to Biodiversity mapping for the site see Figure 4.

5.2 Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979

5.2.1 Evaluation

Section 4.15 of the EP&A Act (as amended) requires the Council to consider various matters in regard to the determination of the Development Application.

In determining a development application, a consent authority is to take into consideration such of the following matters as are of relevance to the development the subject of the development application:

- (a) The provisions of:
 - (i) any environmental planning instrument, and
 - (ii) any proposed instrument that is or has been the subject of public consultation under this Act and that has been notified to the consent authority (unless the Secretary has notified the consent authority that the making of the proposed instrument has been deferred indefinitely or has not been approved), and
 - (iii) any development control plan, and
 - (iiia) any planning agreement that has been entered into under section 7.4, or any draft planning agreement that a developer has offered to enter into under section 7.4, and
 - (v) the regulations (to the extent that they prescribe matters for the purposes of this paragraph), and
 - (v) (Repealed)

that apply to the land to which the development application relates,

- (b) The likely impacts of that development, including environmental impacts on both the natural and built environments, and social and economic impacts in the locality;
- (c) The suitability of the site for the development,
- (d) Any submissions made in accordance with this act or the regulations,
- (e) The public interest.

The proposed development has been designed with consideration to the following matters, as outlined below.

5.2.2 Integrated Development

Development that requires both development consent and another approval listed under Section 4.46 of the EP&A Act is 'Integrated Development'. The proposed development does not appear to be integrated.



5.3 Environmental Planning Instruments

5.3.1 State Environmental Planning Policy (Koala Habitat Protection) 2019

This policy aims to encourage the conservation and management of areas of natural vegetation that provide habitat for koalas to support a permanent free-living population over their present range and reverse the current trend of koala population decline.

There are no known feed tree species or habitat located on the site. Given that the proposed subdivision does not propose to remove any trees, it is considered that there shall be no disruption on any potential koala habitat areas.

5.3.2 State Environmental Planning Policy No.55 - Remediation of Land

Clause 7 of *State Environmental Planning Policy No.55 – Remediation of Land* (SEPP 55) requires Council to consider the following before granting consent to a DA:

- (a) it has considered whether the land is contaminated, and
- (b) if the land is contaminated, it is satisfied that the land is suitable in its contaminated state (or will be suitable, after remediation) for the purpose for which the development is proposed to be carried out, and
- (c) if the land requires remediation to be made suitable for the purpose for which the development is proposed to be carried out, it is satisfied that the land will be remediated before the land is used for that purpose.

Comment: The site has historically been used for grazing purposes. There is no evidence of any surface contamination present as a result of historical/current uses on the site. Consequently, there is no reason to expect the site to be contaminated in any way which may make it unsuitable for the proposed development. In this regard, no further consideration of SEPP 55 is required.

5.3.3 Blayney Local Environmental Plan 2012

5.3.3.1 Land Use Table

The subject site is zoned R5 Large Lot Residential pursuant to the *Blayney Local Environmental Plan 2012* (LEP). The objectives of the R5 zone are:

- To provide residential housing in a rural setting while preserving, and minimising impacts on, environmentally sensitive locations and scenic quality.
- To ensure that large residential lots do not hinder the proper and orderly development of urban areas in the future.
- To ensure that development in the area does not unreasonably increase the demand for public services or public facilities.
- To minimise conflict between land uses within this zone and land uses within adjoining zones.



Comment: The proposed development constitutes a subdivision, which is permissible and consistent with the specified minimum lot size for the site. The proposed subdivision would not preclude development in accordance with zone objectives and as such the development is considered to support the zone objectives, as listed above.

5.3.3.2 Clause 4.1 Minimum Subdivision Lot Size

Clause 4.1 of the LEP relates to the minimum lot sizes required for subdivision. The minimum lot size for the site is 2ha pursuant to Clause 4.1. The proposed subdivision shall create lots well exceeding the minimum lot size which includes the homestead lot.

5.3.3.3 Clause 6.4 Groundwater Vulnerability

The subject site is mapped as being groundwater vulnerable. Clause 6.4 of the LEP requires council to consider the following matters prior to determining a DA that is located on groundwater vulnerable land.

- (a) the likelihood of groundwater contamination from the development (including from any on-site storage or disposal of solid or liquid waste and chemicals),
- (b) any adverse impacts the development may have on groundwater dependent ecosystems,
- (c) the cumulative impact the development may have on groundwater (including impacts on nearby groundwater extraction for a potable water supply or stock water supply),
- (d) any appropriate measures proposed to avoid, minimise or mitigate the impacts of the development.

Comment: The subject site does contain a water bore which the homestead uses in certain applications. There are unlikely to be any adverse impacts arising from the development that shall is likely to cause concern to the existing bore or groundwater system. Future applications for onsite effluent disposal will need to ensure site constraints are considered including appropriate setbacks to boundaries.

5.3.3.4 Clause 6.8 Essential services

Clause 6.8 of the LEP States:

Development consent must not be granted to development unless the consent authority is satisfied that any of the following services that are essential for the proposed development are available or that adequate arrangements have been made to make them available when required:

- (a) the supply of water,
- (b) the supply of electricity,
- (c) the disposal and management of sewage,
- (d) stormwater drainage or on-site conservation,
- (e) suitable road access.

Comment: The supply of water; road access and associated stormwater control via table drains are considered in **Appendix E**.



Indication has been provided by the relevant authority that power is available with a positive outlook for future reticulation and connection/s.

The disposal and management of sewage shall take place by onsite effluent disposal as is possible for large lot development.

5.4 Draft Environmental Planning Instruments

No draft Environmental Planning Instruments are known to be applicable to the subject site or development.

5.5 Blayney Council Development Control Plan 2018

The *Blayney Council Development Control Plan 2018* (DCP) outlines the requirements for development in the LGA. Each of the sections of the DCP relevant to the proposed subdivision are addressed in **Table 2** below.

F2.2 Topography & Earthworks	The proposed subdivision has been designed to ensure minimal earthworks associated with services. The proposed cul-de-sac road generally follow contours likewise associated table drains water mains. There are no significant water courses onsite.
F2.3 Lot Size and Arrangement	The proposed lot sizes meet minimum lot size requirements with generous road frontages on square shaped parcels. The homestead lot is a little irregular in shape to support the existing tree lined access and improvements.
F2.4 On-site Effluent Management	The subject site is not required to be connected to a reticulated sewage system. The current homestead has operated an on-site effluent disposal system for many years. The proposed lots are large enough and free of constraints to support dwelling/s relying on onsite effluent disposal systems. If required, Council may condition the preparation of a effluent report.

F2.8 Staging	The subdivision is intended to be constructed in a single stage. The clients reserve the right to submit a modified DA or CC or SC, as the case may be, to stage the development depending on the pace of uptake.
F4.1 Access and Road Design	The proposed subdivision has ben through several consultations with Council to address safe access and road design. The majority of lots shall access off the new road which shall encounter estate related traffic and therefore minimal traffic impact is expected. Refer also to TIA in Appendix C .

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F4.2 Access to Battle-Axe Lots	The proposed battle-axe lots are able to meet minimum access requirements.
F4.3 Lots for the purpose of Agriculture	N/A
F7 New or Upgraded Public Roads	The subdivision proposes a new road to be designed and constructed in accordance with Council's engineering requirements. The proposed cul-de-sac shall service less than 25 lots and should be able to service waste collection vehicles. A departure is sought for the cul-de-sac exceeding 125m from the nearest intersection which is considered justified given the number of lots to be serviced is considered appropriate. Refer also to TIA in Appendix C .

5.6 Any Planning Agreement entered into

No Planning Agreements entered into are known to exist in relation to the development or site,

5.7 Any Matters Prescribed by the Regulations

For the purposes of Section 4.15(1)(a)(iv) of the EP&A Act, Clause 92 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulations 2000* (EP&A Regulations) specifies the additional matters a consent authority must take into consideration when determining a DA. In this instance there are no matters prescribed by the regulations that are applicable to this application.

5.8 Any Likely Impacts of the Development

5.8.1 Context & Setting

The proposed boundary adjustment subdivision is consistent with the existing context and setting of the area, which is characterised by rural residential development on the urban periphery. The lot sizes are consistent with other similar lots in the area and shall be able to support future dwelling development.

5.8.2 Flora & Fauna

The site contains extensive expanses of cleared landscape and there are ample options for siting buildings, without any disturbance to the existing flora and fauna, thereby maintaining the ecological integrity of the site. No significant flora or endangered fauna are intended to be impacted as part of this subdivision proposal.

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5.8.3 Social & Economic Impacts in the Locality

The subdivision supports the creation of large lots for residential purposes which is close to a village node and available essential services. The proposed yield will assist in supplying new lots to the market which should aid in housing affordability in and around the locality. Therefore the proposal is considered to provide a positive social and economic impact.

5.9 Suitability of the Site for the Proposed Development

The suitability of the site for the proposed development has been addressed in the above sections of this report. There are no prohibitive constraints posed by adjacent developments. There does not appear to be any zoning, planning or environmental matters that should hinder the proposed development of the site. In this regard, it can be concluded that the proposal fits into the locality and the site attributes are conducive for the development.

5.10The Public Interest

The proposed development is considered to be in the public interest. As outlined throughout this report the development is consistent with the applicable development standards and is not expected to have any adverse off-site impacts.

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6 CONCLUSION

It is recommended that the proposed subdivision of Lot 3 DP 546309, 238 Forest Reefs Road, Milithorpe, be supported on the following grounds:

- The proposal is considered acceptable in terms of the provisions of Section 4.15 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979;
- The proposal is permissible with consent and consistent with the relevant development standards and provisions of the *Blayney Local Environmental Plan 2012*;
- The proposal complies with the relevant provisions of the *Blayney Development Control Plan 2018;*
- The proposed development is not anticipated to generate any adverse impacts in the locality; and
- The proposed development is considered suitable for the site and it's surrounds.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project Outline

The proposed subdivision consists of 15 lots with a minimum lots size of 2 Ha as well as ancillary services. The existing dwelling is to be retained on its own lot. A new internal access road is proposed to service the lots, including a new intersection with Forest Reefs Road opposite the existing intersection with Charles Booth Way.

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2 EXISTING CONDITIONS

2.1 Location and Site

The subject site is located on the northern side of Forest Reefs Road around 2km outside of the town of Millthorpe. It is currently one single residential lot with an area of 36.96 Ha (by title). Access to the site is via Forest Reefs Road adjacent to the south-eastern site boundary.

Existing site access is via a single gravel driveway onto Forest Reefs Road, pictured in Figure 2 below. At the site frontage, Forest Reefs Road is in reasonable sealed condition and is approximately 7m wide, with one lane in each direction, centre linemarking and vegetated table drains on both sides. The road is straight and flat; and exiting the driveway sight distances exceed 250m in both directions. Although the intersection of Forest Reefs Road with Charles Booth Way occurs approximately 180m east of the driveway, visibility of approaching traffic is good due to the flat, clear nature of the surrounding landscape.

2.2 Existing Traffic Hierarchy

The subject site is accessible only via Forest Reefs Road, a local collector road that runs from Millthorpe west towards the rural localities of Fairview and Narellan then continues north towards Sunnyside.



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


Figure 4 Site road hierarchy

2.3 Traffic Volumes

2.3.1 Forest Reefs Road Traffic

Traffic counts for Forest Reefs Road were not available at the time of preparing this report; however based on the remote location, the number and size of the properties the road services, and the population of the nearby town of Millthorpe, it is reasonable to assume that peak flows are well under 350 vph per direction.

2.4 Public Transport

There are no existing regular public transport services in the vicinity of the subject site.

2.5 Pedestrian Access

There are no pedestrian or cycling facilities in the vicinity of the subject site.

2.6 Traffic Safety

Traffic accident history of the area has been obtained from the RMS website. In the five years between 2015 and 2019, there were no crashes recorded within 1km of the subject site.



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3 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

As outlined in Section 1.1, the proposed development is for a 15 lot subdivision with a minimum lot size of 2 Ha, as well as ancillary services and a new internal access road which will meet Forest Reefs Road opposite the existing intersection with Charles Booth Way.

3.1 Traffic Generation

From the rates provided by the RTA Guide to Traffic Generating Developments (2002) for dwelling houses, each lot is estimated to generate a weekday peak of 0.85 trips per hour. Hence by changing from one lot to 15 lots, the site traffic generation is expected to increase from 1 vph to a maximum of 13 vph.

3.2 Proposed Internal Access Road

A new internal road is proposed to service the subdivision. The new road has been designed in accordance with the requirements for a rural local access road within Blayney Shire Council's Development Control Plan (2018) and WBC Strategic Alliance's Guidelines for Engineering Works (2009). It features 3m wide lanes and 1m wide shoulders in each direction; and forms a cul-de-sac at the end. The proposed speed limit is 60km/h.

3.3 Forest Reefs Road Intersection Analysis

The new internal road is proposed to meet Forest Reefs Road approximately 180m east of the existing driveway, opposite the existing intersection with Charles Booth Way. The existing driveway will also be retained as the access point for the homestead lot, where the existing dwelling will remain.

Through correspondence with Blayney Shire Council it was agreed that the most suitable approach for the access road intersection would be Basic Left (BAL) / Basic Right (BAR) type turn treatments. These have been designed in accordance with the AUSTROADS Guide to Road Design Part 4A (2017), including shoulder widening on both sides of the road, and achieve the safe intersection site distance (SISD) requirement for the most conservative scenario, being trucks driving at night. The proposed intersection plan has been included within **Appendix A**.

3.4 Forest Reefs Road Analysis

The peak hourly flows for a mid-block road at various Levels of Service (LoS) are set out in **Table 1** below, and it is recommended that a minimum LoS C is achieved in peak traffic.

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Based on the estimated existing traffic volumes outlined in Section 2.3.1, it can be concluded that Forest Reefs Road is currently operating at a minimum LoS B and will continue to do so once the subdivision has been completed.

Therefore, no upgrades are required to Forest Reefs Road.

3.5 Cumulative Impacts

There are no know development planned in the vicinity of the subject site that could contribute to significant cumulative impact.

We refer to your correspondence dated 7 July 2021 requiring additional information to complete the assessment for the subject Development Application and we wish to advise as follows:

1. Planning

(a) Building envelopes for each proposed lot.

Building envelopes have been added to Drawing No. 32726-P11 in Attachment A; noting the increased setbacks for Proposed Lots 7 & 8 as they adjoin a RU1 zone and we consider them to be generally free of constraint and meet the minimum dwelling setback requirements required under C4.1 of the *Blayney Development Control Plan 2018*.

(b) Landscape buffer

The proposed 50m rear setback for Lots 7 & 8 which adjoin the RU1 zone shall enable an appropriate buffer for tree planting as required. A landscape buffer adjacent to all properties zoned RU1 Primary Production. It is recommended that the planting type/s and spacing/s form part of a conditional requirement.

(c) Effluent Management

Barnson has been engaged to carry out appropriate investigation and reporting in relation to onsite sewage management. We are confident that the proposed lot sizes shall support a conventional septic and trench system. Reporting will be provided under separate cover in coming weeks.

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2. Engineering

(a) Intersection

As required by Council the proposed intersection of the new road and Forest Reefs Road has been relocated at least 15 metres to the south-west of Charles Booth Way. Refer to amended Civil drawings in **Attachment B**.

3. Submissions

(a) Building Envelope

The proposed building envelopes (and setbacks) are compliant with Council's standard/s.

(b) Fencing

There does not appear to be any specific Council requirement for fencing, and none has been provided as part of the proposal. It is the hope of the proponent that future fencing be of a rural type befitting of the setting.

(c) Viability

The subject land is zoned R5 Large Lot Residential and the proposal satisfies minimum lot sizes for the site along with appropriate setbacks and buffers to minimise any potential impact on neighbouring properties.

(d) Lighting

In terms car lights being directed towards dwelling/s opposite the subject site we note the generous setbacks from Forest Reefs Road enjoyed by those dwellings and that the relocation of the proposed intersection to a point further to the west should minimise any potential impact.

4. Road Extension to Lot 2 DP 1204940

Our client is not in favour of the dedication of a road reserve from the proposed culde-sac through to Lot 2 DP 1204940. It has always been their intention to retain as far as possible a rural outlook by providing minimal lots via the cul-de-sac and with that minimise any potential traffic impacts to the proposed estate.

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Our client intends to continue living in the existing homestead and the new lot owners will become their neighbours. They don't wish the development to become an open thoroughfare, with risk of privacy and other such enjoyments being foregone.

Whilst we have not carried an assessment of the access opportunities from Forest Reefs Road to the adjoining lot, in the likelihood that some form of subdivision is contemplated, there does appear to be, at least in terms of line of sight, an appropriate access point available (at a standard to be decided by Council) for further consideration.

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
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
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Attachment A - Revised Subdivsion Sketch Plan

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
