

A State of the Environment (SoE) Report is an important management tool which aims to provide the community and Local Council with information on the condition of the environment in the local area to assist in decision-making.

Since 2007, the Councils of the Greater Central West Region of NSW (see map) have joined to produce Regional SoE Reports as part of Council reporting requirements.

Changes to NSW legislation mean that Councils are no longer required to produce SoE Reports each year, but only once every four years, in the year of the Council election.

However, the participating Councils have decided to continue reporting on an annual basis so that they can provide a detailed Regional SoE report that covers trends in the intervening years.

This is a brief snapshot of data for the Blayney Local Government Area in 2018-19 across a range of environmental indicators as shown in the tables below. The tables provide an understanding of trends by comparing this year's data with an average of previous years.

2018-19 Highlights

- Landuse conflict complaints were at their lowest level in the past four years.
- Restocking of native fish species into local streams was at its highest level in the past three years.
- Water consumption in 2018-19 was lower than last year but greater than the average for the past three years.
- The volume of material recycled in 2018-19 was significantly higher than the previous three years.
- Council's total greenhouse emissions were at their highest level in the past four years.

CASE STUDY: Solar and lighting upgrades (Blayney LGA)

Blayney Shire Council was successful in obtaining funding through the NSW Office of Local Government Innovations Fund program, to bring renewable energy to Blayney Shire. Council focused on delivering solar and lighting upgrades at various high energy usage sites, including its offices, CentrePoint Sport and Leisure Centre, depot and the sewage treatment plant. Delivering energy saving projects at these facilities of high electricity demand is set to reduce impacts on the environment whilst also providing cost savings to the community.

The lighting project included the replacement of existing lights at Council's depot and CentrePoint Sport and Leisure Centre, with new high efficiency LED lighting in compliance with all relevant regulations and standards. The lighting project design incorporated sensors to switch selected areas on/off based on light and/or movement, providing safer environments for staff and users.

The Solar PV project delivered under the same program at the sewage treatment plant, Council office, Council depot and CentrePoint Sport and Leisure Centre has assisted in the reduction of the financial impacts of the new electricity supply contract. The on-site solar generation directly offsets consumption at the installed sites, resulting in decreased costs of purchased electricity.

To date a total of 105kW of solar equipment has been installed across the four sites with an anticipated reduction in consumption of approximately 120MWh of grid power annually.
