Emergency Management Plan

Councils role in emergencies

Council acts as the liaison between local emergency services agencies and the community, coordinating planning and response to emergencies within the Blayney Shire Local Government Area (LGA).

Emergency Management within the Blayney Shire LGA is coordinated by the Blayney Shire Local Emergency Management Committee. Council is required to support the Committee to ensure that arrangements are in place for the prevention of, preparation for, response to and recovery from emergencies within the Blayney Shire LGA.

The Blayney Shire Local Emergency Management Plan (EMPLAN) details the roles and responsibilities of responders and community partners, and details how support will be co-ordinated in the preparation for, response to and recovery from emergencies.

Plan to evacuate

It is important that you consider the different emergency situations that you may find yourself in and where you might evacuate to if a particular scenario occurs. It is essential that you remain flexible during an emergency situation.

Follow directions given to you by emergency services agencies.

Reduce the risk to your Home

There are simple steps that you can take to reduce the risk to you and your property. By addressing hazards on your property, you limit the potential harm to your home and its occupants.

- Clean out gutters and downpipes.
- Trim overhead trees and branches.
- Secure or put away loose items.
- Check the roof is in good repair.
- Do a home safety audit and check your smoke alarms are working.
